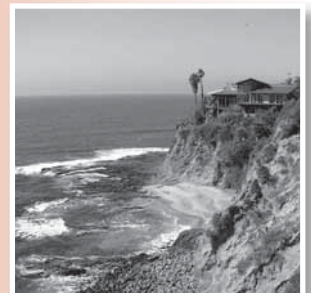

Plans are well under way for the 2012 CalABA Conference! We will be returning next February to the recently remodeled Hyatt Regency Orange County in Garden Grove, California. The 2012 CalABA Conference program will provide a multitude of presentations on theory and basic research as well as applied research and practice. This year's program will also feature invited addresses and workshops by numerous researchers and scientist-practitioners in each of our 11 program areas: Rebecca McDonald, The New England Center for Children (Autism); Matthew Normand, University of the Pacific (Clinical/Medical); Meeta Patel, Clinic 4 Kidz (Developmental Disabilities); Philip Chase, Cambridge Center for Behavioral Studies (Education); David Schaal, Accuray (Experimental); Jane Fisher, University of Nevada, Reno (Human Development & Gerontology); Heather McGee, Western Michigan University (Organizational Behavior Management); Gary Martin, University of Manitoba (Other); James Carr, Behavior Analyst Certification Board (Professional, Ethical & Legal Issues); Hank Schlinger, California State University, Los Angeles (Theoretical, Conceptual & Philosophical); and Ruth Anne Rehfeldt, Southern Illinois University, Carbondale (Verbal Behavior). You can expect this truly impressive line-up of speakers to cover a diverse array of fascinating topics.

We are honored that David Wacker from the University of Iowa will present as the Glenda Vittimberga Memorial Lecturer for 2012. This very special lecture continues to honor the memory of former CalABA Board member Glenda Vittimberga.

CalABA is very happy to continue with the Public Policy & Leadership track for 2012. Conference attendees can expect an impressive lineup of speakers to present on important public policy and leadership issues in the state of California and beyond. **Gregory Madden, Ph.D.,
Utah State University**

Dr. Gregory J. Madden received his M.S. degree from the University of North Texas in 1992 and his Ph.D. degree from West Virginia University in 1995. He began his study of behavioral economics during his post-doctoral years at the University of Vermont. Dr. Madden is currently an Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology at Utah State University where his research is largely focused on the behavioral economics of addiction and health decision-making. Much of Dr. Madden's research in this line has focused on impulsive decision making. His early research documented extreme impulsivity in individuals addicted to illicit drugs and cigarettes. Later research revealed that impulsive decision making appeared to predict cocaine self-administration in rats. His current work is exploring the possibility of experimentally manipulating impulsivity. Can it be done? Does it affect addiction-related decision-making? Dr. Madden's second, and more recent, line of research explores behavioral economic approaches to influencing the dietary decisions made by children. These research endeavors are supported by grants from the National Institute on Drug Abuse and the US Department of Agriculture. Dr. Madden serves on several advisory committees and is the Editor of the *Journal of the Experimental Analysis of Behavior*. He co-edited (with W. K. Bickel) *Impulsivity: The Behavioral and Neurological Science of Discounting* (APA Books), and is the Editor-in-Chief of the forthcoming *APA Handbook of Behavior Analysis (Volumes I and II)*.



Behavioral Economics & Health Decision Making

Behavioral economists are often to be heard on the news explaining why we are in the mess we are in. In an effort to demonstrate their scientific currency, pundits on both sides of an issue appeal to behavioral economics to explain why the other side is misguided and delusional. Policy makers add behavioral economists to their stable of advisers so that they may obtain recommendations beyond what an old-fashioned economist might provide. So, what is behavioral economics? Is it more than prospect theory? Have behavior analysts contributed to this field? Does behavioral economics provide a conceptual system compatible with a behavior-analytic world view? If I understood behavioral economics, would it affect my professional practice or the choices I face on a daily basis (e.g., could I pursue a second career as a pundit)? Answers to some of these questions will be provided in this informative and entertaining talk.

**Alan Poling, Ph.D.,
Western Michigan University**

Dr. Alan Poling is a Professor of Psychology at Western Michigan University. He joined the faculty there in 1977 after receiving his B.A. in 1972 from Alderson-Broaddus College, his M.A. in 1974 from West Virginia University, and his Ph.D. in 1977 from the University of Minnesota.



His primary research interests are in psychopharmacology and behavior analysis; grants from the National Institutes of Health and Department of Education have supported much of his work. Dr. Poling has published 11 books and over 250 articles and book chapters and served as the research advisor of 28 Ph.D. recipients. He was recognized as a Distinguished Alumnus of West Virginia University in 1999 and a Distinguished Faculty Scholar at Western Michigan University in 1996. In 2003, Dr. Poling received the Western Michigan University College of Arts and Sciences Outstanding Achievement in Research and Creative Activity Award.

Lessons Learned in Forty Years

My training in behavior analysis began in 1972, when I entered the graduate program in psychology at Western Michigan University and Andy Lattal was assigned as my advisor. From that time to the present, I've been involved in behavior analysis. The purpose of this presentation is to overview what I've learned from that involvement. Using projects in which I was or currently am involved as examples, I will discuss how behavior analysis has changed across time and offer suggestions for increasing the likelihood that the discipline will survive and prosper. Because the project is often of general interest, I will describe in some detail an ongoing project involving the use of giant African pouched rats (*Cricetomys gambianus*) to detect tuberculosis and landmines. The presentation is intended for a general audience and no particular expertise is needed to understand it.

**2012 Glenda Vittimberga Memorial Lecturer
David Wacker, Ph.D.,
University of Iowa**

Dr. David Wacker, Ph.D., is a Professor of Pediatrics and Special Education at The University of Iowa. He directs two outpatient clinic services for children and adults with disabilities who engage in severe problem behavior. He is the Co-Principal Investigator on an NIMH-funded research project evaluating delivery of functional analysis and functional communication training via teleconsultation with young children with autism. He previously served as the Editor of the *Journal of Applied Behavior Analysis*, as a standing panel reviewer for the National Institutes of Health, and as the President of the Society for the Experimental Analysis of Behavior. He received the 2000 Applied Research Award for Outstanding Contributions to Applied Behavioral Research from the American Psychological Association's Division 25, the 2002 Distinguished Research Award and 1987 National Educator of the Year Award from the Arc of the United States, the Association for Behavior Analysis Student Committee Outstanding Mentorship Award, 2008, and the University of Iowa College of Medicine Distinguished Mentor Award, 2011.



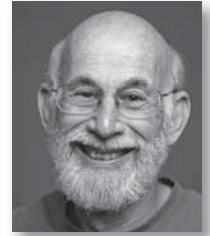
Treating Problem Behavior Remotely via Teleconsultation for Children with Autism

In this presentation, I will describe the procedures and results from a 3-year NIH-funded project that evaluated the use of teleconsultation with young children (6 years and younger) with autism who displayed problem behavior. All children initially received diagnostic evaluations at the Center for Disabilities and Development (CDD). They then attended weekly sessions at regional health care clinics in their communities and received consultation via teleconsultation from trained behavior therapists located at the CDD. All parents conducted functional analyses of the problem behavior and functional communication training. The results achieved were compared to previous projects that conducted the same procedures in the children's homes by trained behavior therapists. The specific procedures and teleconsultation system used in the current project will be described. Both the advantages (serving children in rural areas) and disadvantages (not having direct contact with the parents or children) will be discussed along with summary data. Future applications of teleconsultation for delivering behavioral services to children with disabilities will be described.

**2012 CalABA Outstanding Contributor to Behavior Analysis
Allen Neuringer, Ph.D., Reed College**

Allen Neuringer obtained his B.A. from Columbia College in 1962 (Fred Keller taught his Introductory class), his Ph.D. from Harvard University in 1967 (Richard Herrnstein advised his thesis), and taught at Reed College in Portland, Oregon from 1970 until his retirement as MacArthur Professor of Psychology in 2008. He continues to teach Functional Variability as emeritus professor. His research has shown that pigeons can discriminate among musical episodes, e.g., Bach versus Stravinsky; that pigeons' self control is governed in ways similar to Walter Mischel's children; and that rats and pigeons will respond for food reinforcers even when food is freely available, sometimes referred to as contra freeloading. He has also published on the possibilities of self experimentation. Since the early 1980's his research has focused on reinforced variability – its characteristics, implications, and applications. He lives at the Ridge, a forested area in western Oregon, in a house he built with Martha, his spouse, and Reed students; and plants trees and feeds birds.



The More-or-Less Voluntary Operant

Operant responses are said to be voluntarily emitted and contrasted with elicited reflexes, conditioned and unconditioned. But some operants appear to be more voluntary than others – think addiction and compulsion versus artistic or scientific activities. Research on control by reinforcers over levels of variability will help us better to understand the voluntary nature of the operant, and the voluntary continuum. Reinforcers and discriminative stimuli precisely control levels of response variability, from stereotypy to random emission. I will provide an overview of research on reinforced variability, with emphasis on recent work both in the operant field and elsewhere. I will also discuss real-world applications relevant to shaping, creativity, problem-solving, and behavioral pathologies.

- (1) **Professional**—Any person holding a bachelor's degree or above in any field and who works full or part-time in behavior analysis.
- (2) **Certified**—Any person meeting the criteria for Professional member who is also certified by the Behavior Analyst Certification Board, Inc.
- (3) **Student**—Any person classified as a student in a program of study leading to a degree in behavior analysis or a related discipline, and/or enrolled in a BACB-approved program to meet course requirements for BACB certification. Verification of student status must be provided by an administrator or faculty member of the program in which the student is enrolled.
- (4) **Associate**—Any person holding a bachelor's degree or above in any field and who works full or part-time in a field other than behavior analysis.
- (5) **Affiliate**—Any individual with an interest in behavior analysis who does not qualify for Professional, Certified, Associate, or Student membership.
- (6) **Lifetime**—Any individual recognized by the Board of Directors for sustained contributions to CalABA and the field of behavior analysis. Lifetime members shall receive free membership in the organization in perpetuity.

The designation "Supporting" shall be prefixed to the membership designation of any individual in any of the preceding categories who pays additional annual dues of \$50.
